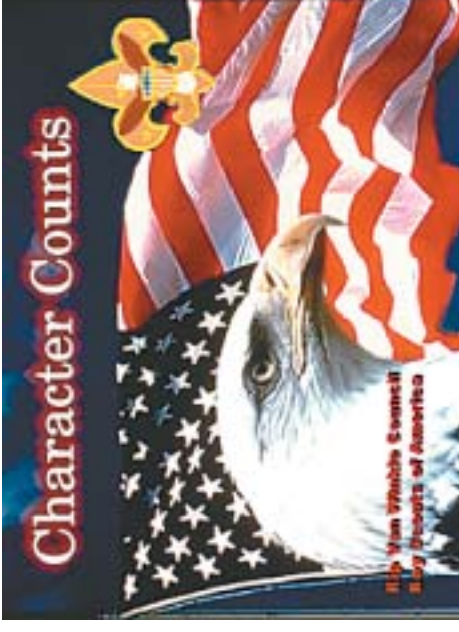

OUR DISTINGUISHED CITIZEN EUGENE P. HESLIN, M.D.



Eugene P. Heslin, MD is an alumnus of Fordham University, where he earned Bachelors and Masters degrees in Chemistry. In 1989, he received his Medical degree from the University of Texas at Houston and then returned to his home state of New York to complete his Family Practice training at The Mid-Hudson Family Health Institute Residency program in Kingston. Upon completion, Dr. Heslin opened his own private practice in Saugerties. During the next 18 years in the practice grew significantly and developed into Bridge Street Family Medicine, which now includes six primary care physicians serving the community in an expanded, state-of-the-art medical facility. Under Dr. Heslin's guidance, and with the engagement of the entire office staff, the practice recently achieved a prestigious Level 3 Patient Centered Medical Home status through the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA). The NCQA seal is a widely recognized symbol of quality in the healthcare field.

Dr. Heslin has consistently played a dominant role in the local medical community. He became a member of The Kingston Hospital Board in 2001 and subsequently Chairman of the Board in 2006. Over the next few years he was instrumental in the successful integration of a Catholic hospital (Benedictine) and a secular hospital (Kingston) under a single corporate parent. This merged hospital entity is now commonly known as the HealthAlliance of the Hudson Valley and Dr. Heslin currently serves as Chairman of the Board.

Dr. Heslin also holds key positions in numerous other healthcare endeavors at the regional, state and national levels. He is currently Medical Director of the HealthAlliance Diabetes programs; a diplomate of the American Board of Family Medicine; a member of the American Academy of Family Physicians; a member and Past President of the Ulster County Medical Society; and a diplomate to the Medical Society, State of New York House of Delegates. Dr. Heslin remains active in Healthcare Information Technology (HIT), serving as one of the founding members of the Iaconic Information Network and Community Regional Health Information Organization (THINC RHIO) board in the Hudson Valley; and the NY e-Health Collaborative Board and Executive Committee.

When he is not practicing medicine, Dr. Heslin can often be found in the serenity of hiking trails. He is an avid hiker and mountain climber, which he proudly traces back to his Scouting heritage during which he became an Eagle Scout and Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow. Dr. Heslin continues to volunteer his time to Scouting and still serves as an advisor to Venture Crew 1369. For his lifelong commitment to the Scouting program and ideals, as well as his unending commitment to our community's healthcare, the Rip Van Winkle Council is proud to publicly recognize Dr. Eugene P. Heslin as the recipient of our 2010 Distinguished Citizen's Award.

God and Country Award

Reverend Charles Stickley attended Western Theological Seminary in Holland, Michigan and graduated in 1964 with theological certification and his Bachelor of Divinity Degree from the Reformed Church in America. His first parish after ordination was the East Lawn Reformed Church in Muskegon, Michigan where he served with his family for the following ten years. During that time "Rev" returned to Western Seminary to obtain his Masters of Theology degree in 1965. In 1973 he was called to serve the Hurley Reformed Church, where he remained steadfast for the next 33 years, until his retirement at age 70 (one of the mandates of the Reformed Church in America).

From the beginning, Scouting has been a part of "Rev's" ministry. In Michigan, he worked closely with both Cubs and Boy Scouts, fulfilling several chaplain duties at a local Scout camp on the shores of Lake Michigan. During his many years in Hurley, "Rev" repeatedly assisted dozens of Troop 20 Scouts with their God and Family Awards and God and Country Awards, as well as organized and participated in countless "Scout Sunday" and Eagle ceremonies.

"Rev" has also worked hard and long in the service of others, both in the Church and in the community. He is a Past President of the

American Cancer Society; has served on multiple not-for-profit boards, including: Kingston Hospital; the YMCA of Ulster County; Ulster County Office for the Aging; and the Hurley Lions Club. Rev. Stickley is also the Chaplain and a Life Member of the Hurley Fire and Rescue Department; and has served as Chairman of the Town of Hurley Ethics Committee. Through his ministry, "Rev" has served as the President of the Classis (all RCA churches) of Mid-Hudson for two terms; President of the Synod of New York for two terms; and Chairman of the Church Planning and Development Committee for the RCA. After his "retirement" from the Hurley Reformed Church, the "Rev" served the Woodstock Reformed Church for a year in their search for a new pastor. He presently has served the High Falls Community Church for almost two years as a Contract Pastor for that congregation.

Kenneth E. Dudley is a life long resident of the Greenville area. As a boy, Ken was active in Boy Scout Troop 42 in Greenville, and during his formative years he lived and worked at the Sunny Hill Resort. Ken credits Arnold and Mae Nicholas, the owners of the resort, with providing him the opportunity to learn the strict work ethic that would later serve him so well in his own business.

After proudly serving his country as a Staff Sergeant in the United States Air Force from 1965 thru 1969, Ken worked for a number of years as a laborer and paver for Simpson Paving Company and Lanzette Marble Company before becoming a heavy equipment operator for Don Millious Construction Company. In 1978, Ken and his wife, Anna, opened their first Tip Top Furniture store in Freehold, and later opened a second store in Hudson. In February of

2006, Ken and Anna continued to invest in their community with the purchase of the Freehold Country Store and Deli.

In addition to contributing to the economic development of Greene County, Ken also served his community as a member of the County Legislature up until last year. He has also served as a member of the Freehold Fire Company for more than 25 years and is a past president of the Greenville Kiwanis Club. Ken has been a member of the Greenville School Board and maintains an active interest in the future of Greenville by serving as Chairman of the town's Planning Board and Zoning Board of Appeals.

Ken's business acumen continues to benefit Greene County's tourism industry through his active role in the Michael Quill Irish Cultural Center in East Durham. Greene County takes great pride in its Irish Community and Ken has enjoyed the challenges of helping them bring their dream of an Irish Center to reality.

Community Stewardship Award



Diane Reeder is the founder and executive director of the Queens Galley, a not-for-profit organization that provides awareness, education, relief and prevention of food insecurity in America. The Queens Galley, located in Kingston, supports, creates and implements programs dedicated to the affordable nutritional education of children, families and seniors.

As a chef, Diane was trained at the prestigious Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park. Her training enabled her to develop the culinary and nutrition education programs required for Queens Galley, which has seen demand for its services increase by more than 150 percent in the past three years. The Queens Galley's soup kitchen operation now serves more than 9,000 meals each month.

Needless to say, Diane's humanitarianism has been recognized by numerous organizations and institutions, both locally and nationally. In 2005, she was the recipient of the Start Something Amazing award from Microsoft CEO and founder Bill Gates; she has been honored by the YWCA of Kingston and the Kingston Christian Women's Connection. In 2008, Diane was named one of the first recipients of Kashi's "Grains of Change" award recognizing grassroots initiatives that have potential to change the world; and just recently was honored as ConAgra Foods Foundation's *National Champion Against Child Hunger*.
